Methodology

- Nationally representative sample of 1,000 members of the public
- Conducted by J.L. Partners for The Daily Mail
- Fieldwork took place 9th-10th January 2020
- Weighted to gender, age, socio-economic group and region
- Margin of error of +/- 3%

James Johnson, co-founder of J.L. Partners and former pollster at 10 Downing Street, said:

"The British public clearly think, when it comes to the Royal Family, that you are either in or out. Despite sympathy with Meghan and Harry's decision, the public do not think they should keep any taxpayer funding, their royal titles, accession rights, or public funding for their security. They also think they should give up Frogmore Cottage and pay back the £2.4m refurbishment of it paid for by the taxpayer.

"Most of all, the public are aggrieved by Harry and Meghan announcing their decision without consulting their Queen, with 71% saying that was the wrong thing to do.

"It has been a difficult few months for the Royal Family, and the monarchy have taken a popularity hit across the board. Harry, Meghan and Prince Andrew see the biggest declines since November. Prince William is now Britain's favourite royal. And Kate is the nation's People's Princess, with 73% of the public preferring her over Meghan.

"Despite all this, faith in the monarchy as an institution remains strong. Asked how long people think it will last, the most popular option with the public was 'forever'."

Key findings

The decision

The public are **supportive** of the decision that Harry and Meghan made to give up their frontline Royal duties, by a margin of 50% to 36%.

But the overwhelming majority of people, 71%, think that announcing their decision without informing the Queen in advance was the **wrong thing to do**.

Most people (44%) think **Meghan was chiefly responsible for the decision**, followed by both equally (39%). Only 4% of the public think Harry was behind the decision.

Royal privileges

The British public resoundingly think that Harry and Meghan should **lose their privileges** as a result of the decision.

76% think they should not receive **any** financial support from the Royal Family or taxpayer at all – and similar numbers say they should also **lose financial support for official overseas visits (64%), Met Police protection while abroad (76%), and their overall security (73%).**

60% also say they should **give up Frogmore Cottage**, and 60% think they should **pay back the £2.4m of taxpayer-funded refurbishment**. Though more split, more people than not also think Harry and Meghan should **lose their official HRH titles**.

Stay or go

72% of the public think the Queen should **let Harry and Meghan go** while only 16% said that she should try and convince them to stay.

This is particularly marked for people with a positive view of the Queen: 83% of people with a positive opinion of the Queen think that she should let Harry and Meghan go whilst only 7% of those with a positive opinion of the Queen think that she should try and convince them to stay.

Impact on the monarchy

46% disagree the Royal Family is better off without Harry and Meghan, while 27% - just over one in four – agree. 44% say that the decision has **not damaged the monarchy,** compared to 38% - more than one in three - who say it has.

More findings on the decision

More than half of people, 54%, think that Prince Harry should **relinquish his rights of accession to the throne.**

Almost two thirds of people, 60%, agree that the Sussexes have treated the Queen shoddily.

79% of people now believe that **Harry should pay for his own protection** in the same way that Prince Andrew pays for Beatrice and Eugenie's security.

The public are split on whether Harry **should remain head of the Royal Marines**. 39% agree he should, but 36% of people think he should not.

The public do not blame the actions of the Queen and other royals or the public for Meghan and Harry's decision to step back. Only 27% of people think Meghan has not received the support she deserves from the Royal Family, whilst 41% think she has received the support she deserves. The same applies to the public – only 32% think Meghan has not received the support she deserves form the public, whilst 49% think she has received the support she deserves.

Members of the Royal Family

Comparing to a <u>YouGov poll in October 2019</u>, Harry and Meghan have seen big drops in support, with their net ratings down by 20 and 22 points. Andrew has also seen a big fall, down 25.

For the first time, Meghan is now a member of the Royal Family that **more people view negatively than positively**. On a net rating of -2, she is alongside Camilla (-4), Sarah Ferguson (-22) and Prince Andrew (-61) in this regard.

The most popular member of the Royal Family is **Prince William**, closely followed by the Queen and Catherine, Duchess of Cambridge.

But the last two months have not been good for most of the Royal Family, with ratings flat, or down — even the Queen sees a decline of 5 net points. There is good news for Princess Anne, who sees her rating increase by 8 points.

When given the choice, the public **overwhelmingly prefer Prince William to Prince Harry**. Of the two, 65% prefer William and 35% prefer Harry. And **Kate is the real People's Princess** – 73% of people prefer Kate over Meghan (27%).

Monarchy overall

The public **remain supportive of the Monarchy overall**. When asked if it should be abolished 61% of people disagree and only 25% agree. But that is still one quarter of the public who think the Monarchy should be abolished completely.

48% of people think the Monarchy will last forever. 39% of people though the Monarchy would only last another 10-50 years. But only 13% of people said that the Monarchy would not last another 10 years.

Demographic differences

People of all classes have similar views of Harry and Meghan, their decision and the consequences it should have for them.

Older people are even more convinced that Harry and Meghan should lose perks. 49% of those aged 18-34 think Harry and Meghan should not keep Frogmore Cottage, but 71% of over 65s we believe that they should not keep Frogmore Cottage. 85% of those aged over 65 said that Harry and Meghan should lose all financial support from the Royal Family and the taxpayer whilst 64% of under 35s thought the same.

Women have a more positive opinion of Harry. 66% of women said they have a positive opinion of him whilst only 55% of men do.

Meghan and Harry are both more popular with young people and Meghan is distinctly unpopular with people aged over 45. 18-24 year olds are the most positive about Meghan -57% of 18-24 year olds have a positive view of her whilst only 30% of over 65 year olds have a positive view

Younger people are **split on the future of the Monarchy** while older people are overwhelmingly convinced it should and will survive.
